

Michigan Center for Nursing Survey of Nurses 2005

Survey Instrument and Response Frequencies for Registered Nurses Employed in the Upper Peninsula Health Service Area

The Michigan Center for Nursing conducted a survey of licensed nurses in 2005 to collect data on their employment status, geographic distribution, age, plans to continue practicing, work setting, practice area, education, gender, and racial/ethnic background. This report presents the survey responses for registered nurses who entered an Upper Peninsula health service area ZIP code for their primary place of employment. A map of the health service areas can be found in the Appendix.

Unless otherwise noted, response frequencies are for *active* nurses only, i.e., nurses who are working in nursing or a related area on a full-time or part-time basis. Percentages in some tables may not equal 100 percent due to rounding; for questions in which respondents were asked to mark “all that apply,” percentages may equal more than 100 percent.

There were 1,117 surveys returned from RNs employed in the Upper Peninsula health service area, yielding a margin of error of ± 2.9 percent with 95 percent confidence for data for RNs in this health service area. Caution must be taken when comparing data for different health service areas because the number of responses and corresponding margin of error varies among health service areas.

The Michigan Center for Nursing conducted a survey of licensed nurses in 2005 to collect data on their employment status, geographic distribution, age, plans to continue practicing, work setting, practice area, education, gender, and racial/ethnic background. This report presents the survey responses for licensed practical nurses who entered an Upper Peninsula health service area ZIP code for their primary place of employment. A map of the health service areas can be found in the Appendix.

Unless otherwise noted, response frequencies are for *active* nurses only, i.e., nurses who are working in nursing or a related area on a full-time or part-time basis. Percentages in some tables may not equal 100 percent due to rounding; for questions in which respondents were asked to mark “all that apply,” percentages may equal more than 100 percent.

There were 543 surveys returned from LPNs employed in the Upper Peninsula health service area, yielding a margin of error of ± 4.2 percent with 95 percent confidence for data for LPNs in this health service area. Caution must be taken when comparing data for different health service areas because the number of responses and corresponding margin of error varies among health service areas.

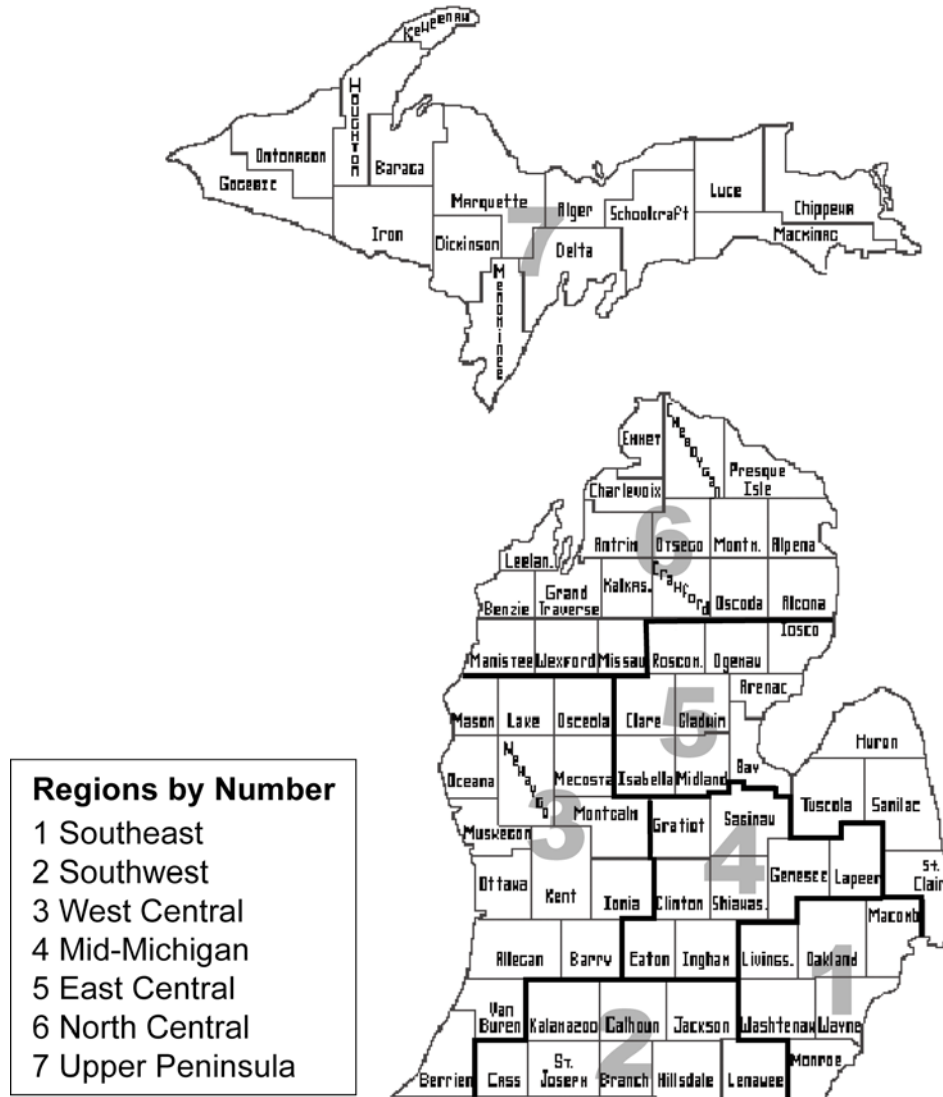
